Shaffer to Again Lead Stark County **Township Association**

100% of the elected officials in the 17 townships within Stark County are members of the SCTA. Those members voted to retain Canton Township Trustee Mark Shaffer to serve as President for a second term. Also retained was Plain Township's Scott Haws who will serve as Vice President, Pike Township's Doug Baum who will serve as Secretary/Treasurer, and Lexington Township's Dan Moore who will serve as Executive Committeeman.

SCTA serves many roles such as advocating for common township causes at the county, state, and federal levels as well as working with the Ohio Township Association and other organizations to benefit township interests. SCTA officials also place a great deal of energy and emphasis toward bringing association members together for collaborative opportunities as well as educational opportunities. Here in Stark County the majority of the population of our residents live in a township, so it is vital the SCTA maintains an active and engaged role in seeing that the township form of government always has a seat at the table.



Fiscal Office Responsibilities

Your Fiscal Office has various responsibilities beyond the prudent and transparent management of township funds. We have taken several important steps recently to enhance security, safety and cyber security:

- Recognizing the ever-increasing threat of cybercrime, we consulted with the Ohio Township Association's
 Cyber IT Risk Consultant as well as our contracted IT provider, Intech Computer Solutions. These experts
 were asked to evaluate the current state of security and offer recommendations to enhance our protection.
 As a result, Canton Township has now implemented and upgraded our systems security accordingly and will
 continue to evaluate needs regularly in the future.
- We contracted with KnowBe4, a leading security awareness training company, to provide ongoing web-based cyber security training to township staff and officials.
- Township Fiscal Office and Zoning Department employees recently completed CPR training, courtesy of our Fire Department's CPR Training Coordinator Cyndi Annen.
- We have ordered an AED (Automated External Defibrillator) to be placed in the main hallway of the Administration building.
- Township administrative staff, elected officials and zoning board members went through an Active Shooter Training exercise on May 13th. We thank the Stark County Sheriff's Department for their support.
- In coordination with the Board of Trustees, we are appreciative of the Stark County Sheriff's Department who now provides a deputy present during public meetings.


Utility Projects

Several utility projects are ongoing, and others will be beginning within the township. Some will cause an ongoing inconvenience and others a temporary inconvenience. Your patience is appreciated.

WATER

Over the next two years construction will be occurring as access to city water will be extended in the remaining

areas south of Carnwise SW to Faircrest Street SW with Cleveland Ave. and Dueber being the east and west borders, respectively. The remaining homes on the east side of Cleveland Ave. with the Nimishillen



Creek being the east border and Faircrest SE being the south border up to the end of the allotment on the north side scheduled to receive water as part of this project.

GAS

Dominion is nearing completion of planned replacement work on high pressure lines throughout the township that we are aware of.

ELECTRIC

AEP continues transmission tower replacement efforts within the township.

SANITARY SEWER

The Lincoln Way Street North Allotment sanitary sewer extension work has been ongoing and should wind down by the summer.

ADMINISTRATION UPDATES Comprehensive Plan **New Legal Counsel**

Canton Township contracted with the Stark County Regional Planning Commission to design the first ever Comprehensive Plan. Plan designers were available at 2021 Community Day to receive input, held a public meeting, and commissioned a community survey to obtain more input. The plan is near completion and plan designers will be at Community Day this year to share status updates and we expect presentation of a completed plan sometime this summer. The Board will then consider adopting the plan and prioritizing actionable outcomes.

The Board of Trustees welcomed Eric Williams as our new additional legal counsel. Attorney Williams was selected after an opportunity to submit a bid was publicized, interviews conducted, and evaluation of existing legal needs reviewed. Since joining the team Attorney Williams has provided new ideas and fresh approaches to township legal matters and has been very engaged and present at all Board of Trustee meetings as well as public hearings conducted by Trustees. The contract for legal counsel service was signed through

Important Information About The Canton Township **Electric Aggregation Program**

Canton Township residents who are participating in the Township's Electric Aggregation Program, may be receiving a notification from AEP, stating that AEP has "Canceled their Generation Service Provider".

The Township's current contracted Electric Aggregation Program Rates are due to expire in May. The township's consultant, Aspen Energy, who manages our Aggregation Program, has been monitoring the energy market to "strike" a new and favorable renewal electric rate for Canton Township residents. This is completed through a type of "bidding" process.

Due to several unique circumstances that have come together at once, the current Supply Rates available (the rates that Aggregator's purchase at) are Higher than the current AEP direct rates available to our residents.

- Our consultant expects this to change in the coming months, but not soon enough to implement in time for May 2022, when our current Aggregation Program ends.
- The circumstances that led to this situation began over a year ago, with the severe cold snap Texas, in addition, current world events along with increasing energy generation and transmission costs have only exacerbated the situation.

While not an ideal situation, our consultant has informed us that it will be best for the residents on our aggregation program, to go back to AEP directly for the time being, until a more favorable rate can be "struck" for our aggregation program. At that time, eligible residents will be brought back into the program...and as always, with an opportunity to Opt-Out, if they so choose.

At the end of our existing program in May, the township residents that are currently participating in the program will automatically go back to AEP and they will need to take no action for this to happen and there will be no interruption in electric service.

As a note, our consultant has informed us that Canton Township is not the only government aggregation program experiencing this issue. Most other electric aggregation programs that are also expiring around this time frame are in a similar position.

The Board of Trustees knows and understands the value this program provides for our residents. We look forward to changes in the market that will allow our consultant to "strike" a rate that will once again benefit Canton Township residents and allow them to save money on their household electric service.

ADMINISTRATION UPDATES

American Rescue Plan Act Funds

Canton Township received \$1.3M in funds from the American Rescue Plan, related to the Covid 19 pandemic. The rules for use of these funds have adjusted periodically since first being made available. Over the coming months township officials will be meeting to begin planning specific uses of these funds that meet eligibility requirements.

State of Ohio Capital Budget Requests

Your elected officials submitted a successful first ever capital budget grant request translating into \$250,000 used to build the new Faircrest Park shelter/restrooms. During the current budget cycle, the Board of Trustees submitted a request for \$350,000 to provide for necessary updates at the Community Center. The Board believes the Community Center can become a centerpiece of the community serving many more residents for various functions and events with this additional investment. The Board also submitted an additional \$370,000 request for continued Faircrest Park improvements that could include a performance stage, armed services/veteran's memorial, as well as an onsite storage building. We hope to hear of positive news regarding these requests sometime this summer.

Looking Forward to Our Future

There is no doubt the past seven months proved to be very active and challenging here at the township, since the sudden loss of our friend and colleague, Trustee Bill Mittas. We could not be prouder of how the community came together to support the Mittas family and continues to support the Mittas family. That is a sure sign of the impact Bill had on so many. We were also equally proud of the community for displaying a high level of engagement during the Trustee appointment process as it was designed to be extremely transparent. Having two handfuls of quality individuals step forward willing to fill Bill's seat, for the remainder of his term, was impressive as well. Now that our township team is fully assembled, while the COVID pandemic is not as widespread, additional events such as Community Day and Safety Day are planned in the future, and many positive projects and initiatives are underway across our township - we all look forward to the future we will continue to build together. We hope to see everyone at an event soon!

FIRE DEPT.NEWS

2021 Fire Department Summary

TRAINING HOURS FOR THE YEAR: The department conducted 2,210 hours of training. This was completed in conjunction with Covid restrictions. Trainings consisted of everything from fire gear inspections to specialty trainings such as rope/water rescue.

EMS calls for 2021: Calls increased 10% from 2020 (1,935 from 1,769)

Non-EMS related calls: Calls increased 17.5% from 2020 (898 from 740)

Fire Prevention Division: 286 business inspections, 50 home visits with 100 smoke alarms installed, 800 elementary school student contacts, and various other prevention and education activities.

STAFFING:

- 1. Current pool of applicants has been steadily decreasing over the past three years.
- 2. Our part-time staff has decreased from 30 members to our current 14 over the past two years.
- 3. We continue to lose both part-time and full-time members to full-time jobs elsewhere with higher wages. Nine full-time employees have left over the past 24 months.
- 4. Our overtime budget has increased approximately 200% over the past three years.
- 5. We are projecting the first half of May to have 419 hours of overtime to fill open shifts and the possibility of not being able to fully staff the fire stations. If this holds true, we will have reached our overtime budget for this year.

Canton Township Voters Approved a New Fire Levy in 2013

What has Been Accomplished Since

In 2013, your fire department asked for, and received, additional financial support from our community. We are now in year ten of this levy and we thought we would share some highlights of what we have accomplished with this funding



- Built a new \$1.8M fire station in our busiest district.
- The Meyers Lake Station (Sta. #3) staffed 24/7 with two personnel
- We increased our full-time fire/medic staffing from nine to sixteen
- We refurbished three 2002 ambulances to extend their life span
- Consolidated our fire administration office to the community center
- Replaced a 26 year old ladder truck with grant assistance
- Purchased a new fire engine to replace a 21 year-old engine
- Refurbished a 2006 fire engine to extend its life longer until replacement
- Updated stations to better accommodate full-time staffing
- Live-fire training facility added to our training grounds
- Added a full-time, cross-trained fire department mechanic
- Added a full-time assistant fire chief
- Vehicle exhaust systems added to all stations
- New fire engine arriving in June 2022



ELRE DEPT. NEWS

Cost Saving Measures

The department has taken many steps to reduce expenses and to find alternative funding sources to make your tax dollars extend even farther. With other financial resources, such as grants, we would not have been able to accomplish many of the listed projects.

- We have sought after and received many grants. Since 2014, these grants have provided a combined total of \$1,326,207 to our budget. These grants have covered a large portion of the cost for a new ladder truck, individual turnout gear, power cots, new SCBA's, station exhaust capture systems, a live fire training facility, and miscellaneous fire and EMS equipment.
- We consolidated from seven buildings to three. We now have a combined fire administration office, training facility, fire station, and the Community Center all in one facility. Additionally, we operate a fire station in the Waco area and Meyers Lake area.
- We have eliminated/sold outdated and unused equipment. Older high-maintenance equipment has been replaced. We are now functioning with fewer but more efficient vehicles and equipment.
- We sent three of our 2002 ambulances back in to have a new chassis put under them and the boxes refurbished. This process, at a cost of \$78,000, extended the life span of the unit another ten years. We will get over twenty years of service from these units. Units are normally replaced around ten years. A new ambulance averages about \$270,000.
- We have transitioned to remote trainings and meetings when possible. This has saved on fuel and wear and tear on our vehicles, while also reducing response times.
- We have joined purchasing consortiums that enable us to participate in group buying power for supplies, equipment, and health insurance.

The Next 10 Years...

Although we have completed many projects over the last ten years, the department still has many needs to address especially regarding equipment, technology, and staffing.

Industry standards as well as federal guidelines continually need addressed. For instance, fire turnout gear has a tenyear life expectancy set by the NFPA (National Fire Protection Agency). Additionally, tires on emergency vehicles are mandated to be replaced every seven years regardless of miles or wear on those tires. One fire truck can cost thousands of dollars to replace a full set of tires. As we can all relate, the current inflation factor is having a major impact on the fire department budget.

Capital improvements, equipment replacement, and staffing tops our list of needs as we look forward to the immediate and future needs of department. Some projects we are planning for include:



- We are in the process of planning the replacement of our three front-line ambulances. These 21 year old units, which we have already been refurbished have passed their life expectancy. The current cost a new unit is about \$270,000. We will need to purchase three of these over the next few years. Current market conditions are placing a 2-year lead time on new units.
- Emergency generators for stations 1 & 3.
- Staffing continues to be an ongoing issue. Additional plans are in place to increase our full-time staff to help shore up and secure our daily staffing and reduce overtime.
- Continued increases in the cost of operating the department, regarding supplies, maintenance, fuel, insurance, etc.... will need to be mitigated as our current budget will allow.

Partnership with University of Akron Continues


In 2021, Canton Township Fire Department entered into an agreement with University of Akron Fire Training Program. This relationship is continuing

Sheriff's Office Dispatch Contract Renewed

The fire department has recently renewed its contract the Stark County Sheriff's Office for dispatching emergency runs for the fire department. Calls to 911 are dispatched directly by the 911 dispatcher. Calls are



no longer transferred to a private dispatch center. This has eliminated time lost in transferring a call and the possibility of calls dropping.

Fire Department has Full-time Mechanic on Staff

The fire department has a full-time cross trained mechanic on staff. Jeff Yerian handles most vehicle maintenance and building maintenance for us. There are very few jobs that require offsite repairs resulting in large savings to our maintenance budget. Jeff is also a firefighter/ EMT and can assist with calls when things get busy.





How is Canton Township Staffed

The fire department currently is set up to have seven personnel on duty 24 hours a day/seven day a week to staff our three stations. This includes 1 full-time shift commander, 4 full-time fire/medics and two part-time fire/ medics. We also have one full-time fire prevention person on day shift as well as our chief and assistant chief.

As with most departments, staffing is proving to be one of the most challenging aspects of daily operations. Over the years, the number of available firefighters and paramedics to hire from has drastically been reduced. This shortage has been having an ever-increasing impact on our ability to maintain daily staffing.

Recruitment and Retention...

Recruiting new firefighters has been only half the battle. Once we get them hired, through probation, and training, we have the retention side to maintain. With the current shortage of firefighters to hire from, employees now have the advantage. Every department is scrambling to fill positions. Employees now can float from department to department as they seek better pay, location, incentives, and so on. Many departments are hiring employees away from other departments via lateral transfers.

Here are some various facts on Canton Township hiring over the last few years.

Since 2013: We have hired 107 part-time fire/medics.

Of the 107 hires, 100 are no longer with us for various reasons

- 31 left for full-time jobs elsewhere
- 34 left for personal/other reasons
- 17 were promoted to full-time with Canton Township (10 have left for full-time jobs elsewhere)
- 12 could not meet the minimum requirements or complete probation
- 5 retired

Training a New Recruit...

When we bring on a recruit, there is large amount of training and expense involved to get the recruit ready to work shifts and respond to calls. Currently the cost involved with bringing on a recruit is \$6,600. This encompasses background checks, physicals, and uniforms. Additionally, this includes the manpower expense for everyone from the assistant chief, assistant training officer, additional staff overtime expense, and a 40-hour orientation program. When we add in the additional expense for the recruit to do ride-along training it becomes very costly to train a recruit. If you look at the 100 hires that have left Canton Township and multiply that by the \$6,600, we have lost over \$600,000 in training expenses.

Safety Inspections – *2022*

We have completed 100 annual fire inspections this year and thirty-eight re-inspections.

Safe Home Program

We have completed 11 home safety inspections and all are safe with working smoke alarms. We completed assembly of a patient lift for a resident. The smoke alarms were provided by the Red Cross, at no cost for the fire department.

Safety Education

Letters are sent out to the businesses from the National Fire Safety Council for donations for the Fire Pup Program, a 5013C company where we get our safety literature from. It is distributed to our daycares and the Canton Local School District.

We do offer to Canton Township businesses, daycares, and other organizations, safety talks, fire extinguisher training, CPR, and first aid classes.

- 1. We participated with Walker kindergarten registration this year.
- 2. Safety Valentine cards sent out to all our daycares and for Walker Kindergarten.
- 3. Boy Scouts & Girl Scouts station tour.

To date we have encountered / delivered safety messages to over 900 students and adults.



Canton Township Yard Waste Site

2022 Operating Days: Wednesday, Saturday, and Sundays 9:00 am until 7:00 pm

Canton Township has received an operating grant for the 2022 season from the Stark-Tuscarawas-Wayne Joint Solid Waste Management District in the amount of \$45,100. This helps us cover the cost of having the yard waste material hauled to a composting facility.

This site is for residential yard waste only. NO **COMMERCIAL DUMPING.** Residential yard waste is lawn clippings, tree limbs/branches, and other organic vegetation from around your yard. This site does NOT accept any type of household trash, railroad ties, landscaping timbers, concrete, brick, rocks, pallets, construction debris, food waste, plastic, or any other non-organic material.

Our yard waste site is monitored 24/7 with cameras. When illegally dumped materials are found the Stark County Sheriff's office is notified are offenders can be prosecuted.

In 2021 our facility loaded out 1,590 tons of yard waste which attributed to \$40,300 in hauling expenses.

Looking to the future... The Waste Management District is looking at discontinuing grant funding for our yard waste site. The Canton Township Board of Trustees along with other Township personal are looking at several possibilities to be able to keep this service available to our community. As information becomes available it will be shared.

2021/2022 Winter Season

As the winter season is finally over, we can look back and remember all the early mornings and late nights that the dedicated personal have put into keeping our roads as safe as we can. It takes a team effort, and every employee does his/her part. Keeping the 196 lane miles of Township streets and 2 lane miles of Village streets safe for travelers is our first priority. We try our best to be the best and the community has grown to expect it.



Snow and Ice is nice to see and especially around the Holidays, but it comes at a price. Keeping the streets cleared and safe is expensive when you add up everything that goes into it. Labor, fuel, salt, and vehicle maintenance/replacement are the big-ticket items. Here are some totals for the season:

- > 2.393 tons of salt were used at a cost of \$189,354.
- > The Public Works Department personnel were out a total of 41 times, 31 times to apply salt, and 10 times to plow the streets and salt. Also 3 of those events lasted between 24 and 48 hours which requires the drivers rotate shifts to be able to get some sleep. This cuts our personal in half and only allows us to put 4 to 5 trucks on the road at a time instead of the entire crew.
- Personnel put in a combined total of 1,774.25 hours for snow and ice mitigation. 320 regular hours and 1454.25 hours for a total labor cost of \$50,687.
- > Vehicles and equipment play a crucial role in helping us achieve our safe streets with the cost being \$112,822.80. This includes fuel, wear and tear, and small repairs which had to be made. Fortunately, we did not have any major breakdowns this year.



Catch basins play an important role in Canton Township's storm water system. You will see these in various sizes and shapes through out the Township. These are required for letting water into the system, maintenance of the system, and inspection. If you or your neighbor have one or more of these in or around your property, please keep them clean. By removing trash, leaves, and grass clippings from the grate you are allowing water to enter the system and help with storm water drainage.





The Public Works Department took delivery of a new Case 621-wheel loader in October 2021. This replaced the 2009 Case loader which was having some mechanical issues. This loader plays a vital role in the day-to-day operations of the Road Department by loading salt for snow and ice control in the winter, loading yard waste material into dumpsters for removal during the yard waste season, and loading misc. materials throughout the year for the numerous projects being done around the Township.

Service Agreement Between the Village of Meyers Lake and the Canton Township Board of Trustees:

In February the Trustees signed a service agreement with the Village of Meyers Lake to provide certain services through our Public Works Department in receipt of .3 of one mill of inside millage from the Village. This agreement was agreed upon by both entities due to the Village not having personnel or equipment to perform basic street service and repairs. The agreement signed will be for a period of two (2) years beginning January 1st, 2022 and ending January 1st 2024.

Services include:

- ➤ Inspection and report to the Village evaluating streets, signs, and catch basins.
- Snow and Ice control
- Labor to clear and maintain their storm water system (materials billed to Village)
- Pothole patching
- > Street sweeping
- Right of Way tree trimming
- Labor to replace and upkeep signs (materials billed to Village)





Update on Projects Within Canton Township

There are several projects that are ongoing throughout the Township and affect different areas. Be advised that these projects are not being funded by Canton Township but will provide Township residents with better utilities. The projects and areas are as follows:

Canton City Water Project, Phase II

The area of Faircrest St SW to Carnwise St SW on the Southwest side of Cleveland Ave. (40th, 39th, 38th, 37th, Wiseland, Diane, Maplewood, Forestdale). This is for the expansion of the Canton City Water system which was started several years ago. This project is slated to start in June of 2022. The project timeline is for 728 calendar days from the Notice to Proceed date.

Dominion Energy Twelve-Inch-High Pressure Distribution Pipeline Replacement

Several neighborhood streets were affected by this project. They are: 39th SW, Maplewood, Forestdale, Diane, Highview, Carnwise SE and SW, Hollybrook SE. The project consisted of replacing approximately 6,115 feet of 2 to 6-inch bare-steel pipe with coated 6-inch and 12-inch pipe and 135 feet of 8-inch plastic pipe. This project is coming to an end as reclamation work on the roads, and yards is currently being done.

Lincoln Street North Allotment Sanitary Sewer Project

Several streets in the Northeast area have been affected by this project. Streets include Dane Ave NE, 3rd St NE, Marietta NE, Parker, Carrolldale NE, Oliver NE. This project was for the installation of Stark County Sanitary Sewer lines. The project is well underway with most of the new sewer lines installed. Once completed the streets will be repaved as part on the project.

APPLICATION FOR A PERMIT TO EXCAVATE WITHIN TOWNSHIP ROADS OR ROAD RIGHT OF WAYS, TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES:

The permit is issued under the authority of the Board of Canton Township Trustees, by Resolution No. 02-02-22, adopted pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 5571.16. It requires anyone who desires to make any excavation in any Canton Township public road, it's sub surface, or road right of way to obtain a permit for each such excavation prior to the commencement of the excavation. This permit will be issued by the Public Works Department and covers the following:

- New Driveway \$20.00
- Concrete Curb Cut \$20.00
- > Road Cut \$75.00
- > Right of Way \$75.00
- Culvert Installation \$75.00 + \$1.00 per foot
- ➤ Boring Holes \$75.00
- Utility Poles (6 or more) \$50.00
